September 11th Program: An Evening with Mike Klimkos & Fishing the Letort Spring Run

"If you go into a fly shop anywhere: Maine, Montana, Miami, Beijing or Warsaw and mention the Letort, people have heard of it. It is on most fly anglers' 'bucket list.' If you stand along the banks of the stream, sooner or later the entire fly fishing world will pass by." — Mike Klimkos

The September 11th meeting of the PVFF will feature author, Mike Klimkos from Carlisle, PA. Klimkos will be speaking about the Letort Spring Run – world-famous trout fishery at Carlisle – and the ongoing efforts to conserve the headwaters are covered in *The Letort: A Limestone Legacy*, a new book published by the Central Pennsylvania Conservancy and compiled and edited by Klimkos.

"The Letort is the quintessential limestone stream found in the limestone-based valleys of Pennsylvania," said Klimkos, who compiled and edited the 106-page book, and wrote in the forward: "It is the reason that James LeTort settled in the area. The water was clean and plentiful – and it made good beer and whiskey. It still does. The stream also provided power for grist mills and other industrial uses. The town of Carlisle sprang up around the stream and it was important to the community; sometimes for good reasons and sometimes for bad reasons."


"It was on the Letort that Vince Marinaro did his research and began a new chapter in fly fishing when he published his groundbreaking "A Modern Dry Fly Code" in 1950. Marinaro is one of the legends of the Letort profiled by other, current legends in the book. Others are Charles Fox, "Dean of the Letort," and Ed Shenk."

Klimkos, who is the former editor of the "Mid Atlantic Fly Fishing Guide", has pulled together an in-depth section on research and monitoring of the stream and a comprehensive Letort timeline starting at 1720.

"It is important to remember the history of this stream, so we know where we are going in the future," he said. "The Letort is perhaps one of the most historic trout streams in America."

Mike will have copies of the book available to purchase at our Meeting. Proceeds from this book will be used to support the purchase of land along the Letort, by the <u>Central Pennsylvania Conservancy</u>, particularly the 30-acre parcel on the east branch at the headwaters, which functioned as a watercress farm since the 1880s and contains the southern trailhead of the Letort Nature Trail.

#2.) Salmon River; Pulaski, New York Date: Thursday to Sunday, October 11th to 14th

The annual PVFF trip to the Salmon River in Pulaski, New York (NY), will be held on the second weekend of October 2018. Now is the time to book campsites at Selkirk Shores State Park and reserve passes at the Douglaston Salmon Run (DSR). Most PVFF members will be camping on Loop A.

Although the famed Salmon River has miles of public water, anyone interested in attending the outing should consider purchasing a DSR daily pass online on the their website **now** as they will be sold out soon if not already for the days our trip is planned.

The DSR offers a quality experience to a limited number of anglers for the price of a daily rod fee (\$75.00, kids under 15 years of age are free with a paying adult). The fish entering the Salmon River first must pass through the 2-mile section of the DSR where fly anglers have the best opportunity to hook one of these giants. Chest waders and Boots with studded soles are highly recommended. NY State Non-resident Fishing License fees are: \$50.00 annual, \$28.00 for 7 – day and \$10.00 for 1 – day.

For many PVFF members, the annual trip to the town of Pulaski is the highlight of the fishing season. Whether you fish the private waters of the DSR or upstream on the 13 miles of public water, landing a 15 to 30 pound Chinook or Coho salmon on a fly rod is a challenge and certainly a trophy to be admired. There is sure to be Steelhead and Brown Trout in the mix and some Atlantic Salmon as well.

Thank you to PVFF for supporting the 2018 Natural Resources Careers Camp!

The Natural Resources Careers Camp (NRCC), was held on July 22nd to 28th at the Hickory Environmental Education Center in Garrett County, MD. Forty-two students attended, representing 17 Maryland counties. Both Frederick and Washington counties each sent five students. This was the first year in many that the camp enjoyed full enrollment!

Throughout the week, students learned about forestry, wildlife management, fisheries, ecology, arboriculture and watershed management. Activities included measuring trees, sampling plots, visiting saw mills, electro-shocking fish, climbing trees and using GPS and GIS.

I traveled to camp on Thursday to assist with the Urban Forestry and Arboriculture panel discussion and led the tree planting activities throughout the afternoon. I have been assisting with camp for fourteen years volunteering in all sorts of aspects. On college night, students interacted and learned about Natural Resource Programs from Allegany College of Maryland, Garrett College, Pennsylvania State University, University of Maryland, West Virginia University and the University of MD Center for Environmental Science Appalachian Lab.

As the week progresses, students work on a Forest Management Plan that is presented to the staff, parents and landowners on the last day prior to graduation.

NRCC is sponsored by Maryland's Forest Conservancy District Boards, Allegany College of Maryland, the Maryland Department of Natural Resources – Forest Service and the Maryland Forestry Foundation. The camp has been held annually for over 45 years.

Students who will be entering grades 9 through 12 next year and are interested in Natural Resources careers are eligible to apply. Applications will be available for 2019 beginning in January at:
