



Beginner's Fly Tying: Three Variations of the Black and Peacock Spider Wet Fly

Summertime is most definitely upon us, with more hot, sunny days ahead. So we put our pursuit of catching rainbow trout in cool mountain waters aside, and focus our attention on some of the 'warmer' fresh water species, such as smallmouth bass, crappie, and panfish. For these species some fly fishers might tie on a floating terrestrial, e.g. the foam ant or beetle which we learned to tie in our June class.

For our July 19th (note the date change) Beginner's class we will feature a somewhat different fish-food representation — a submerged insect. That is, we will be learning to tie three variations of the Black

and Peacock Spider, a classic wet fly pattern developed by a British stillwater fly-fishing pioneer, Tom C. Ivens, which dates back to the early 1950s.

As a follow-up to the July tying session, I would hope that 'class' participants will fish their Black and Peacock Spider patterns and report back as to which variation was most successful and for which fish species. Tight lines!

Ohiopyle – The Heart of It All?


On Sunday, June 11, 2023, PVFF Club President Andy Mekelburg belatedly celebrated his (December) birthday by fishing the Youghiogheny River in Pennsylvania. The Yough had been on Andy's and my fishing bucket list, and we were fortunate to have Rob Walters of laurelhighlandsguideservices.com guide us on a full-day float trip.

We put Rob's raft in at a private boat ramp literally in the backyard of his residence in Confluence, Pennsylvania. We then spent some time playing "baseball" to brown trout that were rising in the vicinity. That is how Rob described Andy and I taking turns to fish with each of us fishing until we struck out with three "strikes" or caught a fish. According to Rob's rules, a strike occurs when you fail to capitalize on a rise or take or lose a fish. I was pleased to see Andy get the first "hit" if you will by taking a smallmouth bass.

We were blessed with a nice caddis hatch, and I had a lot of fun working to get good drifts down to them. Rob taught us how to do the "Delaware Slide," which is when you cast out toward the bank and then move your rod upstream while taking out line. When executed properly, this allowed the line to drift downstream with minimal drag and resulted in some awesome takes. Over the course of the day, I used it to catch four really nice brown trout; I also had one "LDR" or long-distance release and of course failed to capitalize on about five other opportunities.

As we moved downstream, we did fish some streamers in an effort to entice the lunkers that live in the Youghiogheny. I switched to dry droppers until





we reached some pools where we were able to resume "hunting" brownies who were dining on caddis and drakes. As we did so, Rob taught me how to use a reach cast to avoid drag when fishing out over currents. All in all, we enjoyed a long and successful float and day. While it fluctuated, the weather was nice overall and the scenery, which included a mink and some cormorants, was beautiful. Another memorable learning from our trip was the use of auto-inflate life vests. I had never heard of such a thing and was very happy to be introduced to them as they are not intrusive and provide the protection my wife and daughter have requested. Finally, when we finished in Ohiopyle, Andy and I enjoyed a nice meal at the Falls City Restaurant and Pub.

If you are interested in fishing the Youghiogheny, I encourage you to do so. In addition to its beauty and relative solitude, it provides the feel of fishing on a western river, for those of you who enjoy doing so or wish to have a similar experience.


did his usual marvelous job putting it all together. The food was plentiful and the water flowed like wine. We had some unique contests created by Dennis. The rest of the club learned what I already know: my eyes aren't great, and I am slow stringing a line. First step is to admit it. Lots of fun and ardent competition. The one-fly contest was won, once again, by Seth Denbo, in a prodigious feat of catching fish — although the trout seemed elusive.

As to Alaska, I had the opportunity to go on a cruise from Seattle, up to Skagway and the glaciers and back. (I won't "bore" you with the complete



travelogue, at least not in this column), but rest assured it was everything I expected but better, including the weather. which was hitting over 70 degrees and sunny every day. My son, Cory, accompanied me on this trip and it so happened that I had arranged this fishing adventure on

Father's Day.



I booked a fishing trip out of Ketchikan which was our first stop on the cruise. We met our guide coming off the ship and he drove us to the fly shop. Nice shop with a decent selection of everything, including some Clouser Minnows (thought of you, Bob and Jackie!). After providing us with wades and boots, we took our gear down to the dock and boarded a float plane. It was a clear day and the 30-minute flight was scenic and majestic. We landed in a remote lake far away from anyone and anything.

Our quarry were cutthroats, ones that had probably seen few fishers. We started off wading the shelf around the lake, probably 10-20 feet from shore. Using a sinking tip line, we cast beyond the shelf and let the fly sink before stripping in. I was able to catch one relatively quickly, taking the pressure off everyone. Cory caught one not that long after.

Our guide Nick suggested we get in the boat to hit some of the productive areas he knew. This boat they had out there was this unique vessel, that could actually fold up so that it can fit on a pontoon of a float plane for transportation. Seemed almost like

plastic, but was sturdy and smooth. We found sone very productive areas and I ended up with at least 10 catches (and probably as many misses) and Cory caught 6. The fun part was that the water was so clear, you can see the trout going after the fly, and if you weren't able to set in time, it would keep coming back. Lots of fun.

After four hours of fishing, the plane came back to retrieve us (whew!) On the flight back we spotted a pod of orcas that our pilot circled a couple of times, what a sight. Flawless landing and taxi up to the dock. As our guide was stepping onto the deck, he dropped his phone into the water, which they said was 60 feet deep. Yes, it was surprising that it wasn't me that did that, but the problem was that he had taken all the pictures of us holding fish! So, you'll have to take my word on it – yes, we caught fish, they were beautiful and my biggest was 20". The only proof is in our memory of a fantastic trip.
