Celebrating Bernard "Lefty" Kreh

At our next meeting on September 12th at Tuscarora High School in Frederick, we are going to spend the evening learning about and, yes, doing a bit of reminiscing about fly-fishing legend Bernard "Lefty" Kreh. Lefty passed away in March of 2018 and, as you know, he had a tremendous impact on the sport we all love. In October, the Friends of Lefty Kreh will unveil a statue of Lefty at Baker Park. For over 18 years, he wrote the Outdoor column for the

Baltimore Sun. He wrote over 30 books on fly fishing. He cohosted his own fly-fishing show with Tom Brokaw. He was inducted into the Fly Fishing Hall of Fame and named Angler of the Year in 1997. Plus, he was a local boy: born and raised in Frederick, worked at Fort Detrick, and started his career at the Frederick News Post. Mr. Kreh was a lifetime member of PVFF and a dear friend of the club. I hope you can join us on the 12th.



Beginner Fly Tying: The Turbo Beetle

Summer soon will end and now is the time to think about seasonal-transition fly patterns, which will be useful for a variety of fresh water species. As I began to think about an ideal fly pattern for our September tying session, I considered what artificial fly would both advance the fly tying experience for our beginner fly tiers, as well as provide yet another standard fly pattern for use at this time of year. For those reasons, our September 19th tying session will feature a very realistic and relatively easy-to-tie beetle pattern called the Turbo Beetle. In advance of the September 19th class, I suggest class participants search for and watch a YouTube video on tying this fly produced by Tim Flagler's *tightlinevideo*.

The next Beginner class will be held 7:00 PM on September 19th at Trinity United Methodist Church. As always, we welcome fly fishers who have never* tied an artificial fly to join our beginner fly tying classes; equipment and materials are always provided to newcomers (and PVFF club members) to the 'world of tying artificial flies.'



*Note for all fly tying newcomers: For the past several months our PVFF fly tying instruction has been broadened to provide monthly instruction for members who might never have tied a fly (true beginners), as well as for those who have some experience in fly tying and wish to expand their tying skills and broaden their knowledge of the natural species which we try to replicate.



Meet a Member: Julia Falk

How long have you been fly fishing and when did you join the club?

I accompanied my dad (Craig Falk) on multiple fishing trips during my childhood. One of my early memories is from a vacation and there is a picture of me admiring a fish that he had caught. I started fishing with my dad when I was around 15 years old with my own rod and more independently with supplies. I was able to go on some guided trips and I learned so much more about fishing and how to properly fish. Just in the last couple years, I have started tying my own flies and I love using my own flies to catch trout. I joined the club prior to 2020.



What type of fly fishing do you like the most?

I like to fish in smaller streams and in limestone creeks. I love smaller streams since I can see the water and approach the pockets.

What is your favorite water to fish?

My favorite place to fish is in West Virginia since the water is so pretty and native brook trout give fisherman a run for their money. I also have a great time in Pennsylvania in those streams.

What is your best fly-fishing memory?

My favorite fly-fishing memory is fishing with my family on a family vacation and catching my first fish on my own rod and reel when I was around 15 years old. I was on a guided trip in West Virginia in the last couple years and I caught a 19-inch brown trout on a bamboo rod. I was afraid that the fish was going to break the rod. Luckily, I had the guide to help me, and the net was needed.

What is your favorite fly?

My favorite fly is a Yellow Sally since it is easy to see, and trout love to eat them in the summertime. Also, I like to use stimulators since they annoy trout and they come to the surface to look at them.

If you could only fish with five flies, what would they be?

I would fish with a stimulator, yellow sally, mayfly, perdigon, and a stone fly.

What advice do you have for others?

My advice is to rely on your instincts on a stream and look for the pockets. There might be fish in the more turbulent water but honestly trout are prone to hiding out in pockets near rocks and waiting. The other key to fishing is waiting since sometimes there is so much noise or the fish are spooked. The best fish I have caught and released were ones that I waited for once the water had calmed down.

What is your bucket list fly-fishing trip?

On my bucket list, I would be able to plan a week-long trip to West Virginia that would fit my work schedule.

Do you have any memories of past club events or members you would like to share?

In the past, I have participated in the Catoctin Creek Stream Clean up efforts. I have also had great memories of fishing on guided trips with Mike Holland and Pete Ring. The best times are when I can go fishing on a stream with my dad and spend the day reflecting and enjoying the outdoors.

The August Doldrums


t seems to me that many anglers choose to take the month of August off from their regular trout fly-fishing. Whether it is family vacations or back to school preparations or choosing to avoid the heat due to a perceived notion that there is a low probability of success. I am originally from New York State's "North Country" and I well remember my father regularly telling me that it was too hot to fish, especially as the water levels of our rivers diminished.

Clearly, heat and water levels are factors that can have an impact and require adjustments. However, adjustments are needed throughout the

year and if you want to be successful in less-thanideal weather and water conditions, well, you need to be willing to fish in less-than-ideal weather and water conditions.

I choose to fish this August. While I worked hard and sweated, I had a lot of fun and learned a few things. As they used to say years ago on the "Wide World of Sports," I felt the "Thrill of victory and the agony of defeat."

On August 8 and 9, 2023, I fished Spruce Creek, a famous limestone creek, in Spruce Creek, Pennsylvania at Evergreens Farms. While I had



fished the same section last year, I decided to stop by the Spruce Outfitters on my way. I was eager to get on the creek but am very pleased that I made the choice to take the time to stop. The owner, Allan Bright, is a local legend who guided in the area for 25 years. I was reminded of what a special community exists in our sport when he very generously took an hour or so to review my fly boxes and his offering of flies to select some that would provide a good chance of success.

When I arrived, it was about 3 pm and hot. Nonetheless, I headed to the creek and specifically headed to the section where I caught two very nice brown trout last year to the date. As I caught them last year on a foam beetle, of course, that is what I tried first. And it did not take long for a nice brown trout to rise and take the beetle. I set the hook and began working to bring it in when suddenly, the line went slack. As I reeled in my line, I knew in my heart that it was due to a poor knot. Sure enough, there was the tell-tale curly pig's tail at the end of my line where the beetle had been.

I switched to black and yellow ant, size 16 or 14, that was from Murray's Fly Shop in Edinburg, Virginia. Again, it did not take long before I had a nice take. This time, I was able to bring in a nice 13- or 14-inch brown trout. After taking a break for dinner, I went to a different section of the creek which had leafy cover thanks to overhanging branches. I switched to a caddis and chartreuse nymph dropper which I had tied and ended up taking a nice brown on the dropper.

Much later that night, I went fishing again as I wanted to experience fishing for brown trout with a mouse fly at night. I had a headlight and some mouse flies and went back to the stretch of the creek I had started on earlier in the day. I used the light to tie on flies and to determine where to cast before turning it off. It was thrilling the first few times a trout bumped my mouse fly and exhilarating when I was able to land a nice 16-inch brown trout.

I rounded out my time on Spruce Creek the next morning when I again took a nice brown trout on a hopper dropper combination. It took the nymph, which may have been one I tied. This time, however, as I was working to land it, I somehow stepped on a nest of wasps. Despite some very strong stings, I was able to land and quickly release it so that I could exit the area.

On August 15, I was blessed to fish the Salmon River near Malone, New York near the Canadian border while visiting my family farm. While the



Salmon River is stocked annually, it is a challenging freestone river which flows north into Canada. New York State has done a great job of providing angler access on the river generally and there is angler parking on the Flat Rock Road not far from this spot. The spot, however, is where I finally caught a nice rainbow on a green flashback nymph on the last cast as the sun was setting. It was a very beautiful setting but tough fishing. It is a water that those who enjoy Euro-nymphing would very much enjoy.

On August 20, I found myself in Idaho for work for the week. The first several days, I fished the public access area at the Fox Hills Ranch on the Blackfoot River Road. It is a beautiful river but challenging to fish as it is lined with willows and tall grasses. It also does not present a lot of opportunities to wade fish. On Sunday evening, I was able to catch three small fish on dries (caddis). I think one was a whitefish and another may have been a trout minnow. While not what I had hoped for, it was good to practice casting, knot tying, and different sized dry flies. I also enjoyed fishing at night underneath the Milky Way with the company of ducks and a beaver.

On August 23, I was able to fish a stretch in the morning before work. It was tough fishing amidst the tall grass and in the face of very few rises. I was thrilled that I was able to find the right combination

(Dave's Hopper and Bead-head Pheasant Tail) to hook into a very large fish (I am guessing a 20-inch Cutthroat) but disappointed when I lost it after a spirited fight. After fighting for about ten minutes, it got downstream and I made the (very conscious) mistake of trying to "horse" it back upstream, only to have it roll over in some rapids near a rock and escape. I know I should have played it longer but was afraid of playing it too much and having it die. When I asked my wife if I "caught" the fish, she asked me, "Did you get it in the net?" I knew the

answer to the question when I asked her and will put it down as an LDR (Long Distance Release).

These experiences, while perhaps not yielding stellar results, were fun, soul refreshing, and educational. It reinforced for me that fishing is not about catching the biggest or most fish but rather about taking time to enjoy our environment and life, which goes far too quickly, and trying to learn and apply learnings. In short, don't let lean days on the water or a perception that you are not fishing at the right time keep you from going back and enjoying your time in beautiful settings.

Last Cast

This leads up to the unveiling of Lefty's sculpture, currently scheduled for October 14.
